

Noosa Biosecurity Plan 2020-Fact Sheet 2

Invasive plants-Eradication

Over time, hundreds of plants species have been introduced into Noosa Shire. Some of these species are highly invasive and are a threat to biodiversity, the economy and the Noosa community. Under the *Biosecurity Act 2014*, landowners are required to control invasive species on their land. The Noosa Biosecurity Plan 2020 has identified 10 priority invasive species that occur in Noosa Shire, but with concerted effort, could potentially be eradicated from the shire. 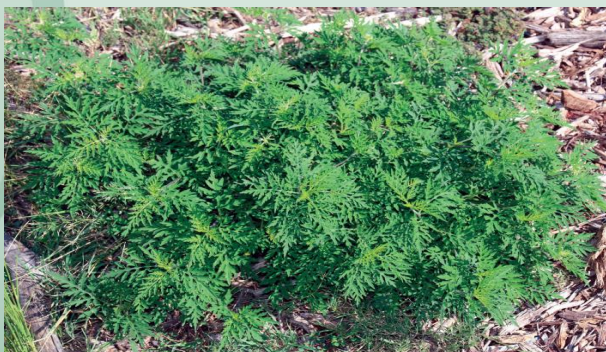
