Noosa River Stakeholder Advisory Committee

1. Welcome by Chairs

The meeting commenced at 5:32pm.

Welcome by Noosa Council CEO Scott Waters.

Scott acknowledged the Noosa River and catchment as home of the Kabi Kabi people as the Traditional Custodians, whose lands, and waters we all now share.

2. Conflict of Interest Declarations

No conflicts of interest were raised by Committee members, and the Code of Conduct was taken as noted.

3. Confirmation of 24 October 2022 meeting minutes

The minutes were taken as read and accepted.

4. Update on the Shoreline Erosion Management Program

Cody Johnston provided an historical overview of erosion issues at Doggy Beach at the mouth of the Noosa River, which began in 2011.

- At that time Noosa was part of the Sunshine Coast Local Government Area. In 2012 a sandbag groyne was constructed and attached to the spit, and renourishment works completed.
- Aerial pictures shown as part of the PowerPoint presentation indicated the groyne was beginning to erode by 2014, and by 2022 erosion of the renourishment works from 2012 had returned Doggy Beach to its 2011 status.
- Council has been considering the best options and has developed the Shoreline Erosion
 Management Program, which will involve the construction of sand plugs at either end of the beach, renourishment works and profiling.
- Work is expected to commence between April and September 2023 subject to environmental permits which will allow or restrict dredging works and will take between 3-4 months.

- Around 170,000 tonnes of sand will be collected from an area still to be approved, contractors to follow up.
- Doggy Beach and the adjacent carpark are expected to be closed for the duration of the works, including a water exclusion zone for vessels where the dredging works are taking place.
- Information for the community will be available before the Shoreline Erosion Management
 Program commences, including a <u>Project News</u> and <u>frequently asked questions</u>, on Noosa Council's
 website next week.

Cody encouraged Committee members to let Council know if there are frequent questions coming from the community that are not covered in the available information, so it can be updated.

Agnes Reed asked where Council intends to get the sand from. Council is restricted to a specified collection zone, which historically has been towards the centre of the channel.

Bruce Davidson asked when the last dredging works in that area occurred. Cody advised the last major works occurred in 2012, but minor works to repair the sandbags have occurred since then.

Phil Moran asked for a description of the sand plug, which Cody explained is essentially a big pile of sand which eventually gets dispersed and confirmed boats will not be able to traverse along the beach. There is a strong current along the beach which causes the erosion, which the plugs and renourishment aim to address.

Michael Gloster asked for clarification about whether placing sand plugs on the southern river shore will cause future erosion on the Noosa River north shore resulting from a channel change. He requested Council report back with trigger points and a contingency plan should this occur.

Joanne Daly asked about the 2012 works and whether a manufacturer's warranty and estimated life expectancy of the sandbags had been provided, given it was only 10 years ago and the works cost \$900,000.

Craig Eldridge noted boats are anchoring in the vicinity, which is causing damage, and that the sandbags are a 'softer option' approach. Harder infrastructure solutions were proposed in 2014, but not approved by Council.

Lachlan Stevens asked about the life expectancy of the new works and whether Council should be investing in a longer-term solution. The sand plug is expected to last around 8 years, although major weather events could cause it to deteriorate more quickly. A monitoring program will be in place with trigger points.

Cody and Craig left the meeting at 5.50pm.

5. Summary of incoming correspondence

The group discussed correspondence received, with MSQ noting the proposed Vessel Waterways Management Plan for the Noosa River will continue to include a speed limit of 6 knots during holiday periods, including the MSQ public consultation period between 7 December 2022 and 13 January 2023.

Correspondence requesting greater access by Personal Water Craft to ramps around the Noosa River was considered and will be taken on notice by MSQ and Council for a response.

6. MSQ - Management Plan for the Noosa River public consultation

On Friday the MSQ Management Plan for the Noosa River will be announced via media release and a link to the public consultation will be available online.

Kell Dillon advised the plan has been pre-approved, and public consultation will take place from mid December 2022 to mid January 2023.

The Management Plan for the Noosa River proposes various zones and a time limit on anchoring in the Noosa River to address congestion, environmental impacts, and provide infrastructure protection.

The goals of the proposal are to maximise the safety and equity of access to the river for all waterway users. It includes formalisation of a 6 knot zone as a safe zone for swimmer's safety, and 6 knots along Doggy Beach during holiday periods.

Sally-Anne Easton demonstrated the public consultation platform which incorporates maps of the areas proposed by the new management plan.

7. General Business

Lachlan Stevens enquired about the jetty feasibility study presentation. Scott Waters noted Councillors are yet to have a workshop about the project therefore an update is still pending.

Committee members asked that the study include consideration of use (demand) and consideration of commercial jetty licences and public jetty access, including the public jetty at the Sofitel. Safety issues were discussed including the need to attach floating pontoons to jetties that are too high out of the water.

Scott Waters confirmed that jetty design and safety issues will need to be considered separately.

Jane Harris asked whether Chaplin Park will have a pontoon, though this has been ruled out by Council previously. Scott Waters confirmed there are no plans for this, although the Department of Transport and Main Roads is currently undertaking a state-wide consultation on recreational boating facilities and demand.

Joanne Daly noted the need for ongoing resourcing of MSQ personnel based in Noosa and thanked MSQ for its investment to date. Kell Dillon noted Maritime Enforcement Team staff have also been rotating through Noosa however resources are constrained across the state.

8. Future of the NRSAC

Scott Waters noted the NRSAC appointments are due to expire at the end of March 2023 and the final meeting date proposed is Wednesday 15 February 2023. This meeting should focus on what NRSAC has achieved, particularly over the last 9 months, with on-water issues.

Council needs to consider the size and scope of any future governance arrangement, and how the intersection between state and local government-controlled aspects of the river will be managed in the future.

9. Meeting Close

Scott Waters thanked the Committee and offered light refreshments, with the meeting closing at 6:51pm.
