Black Mountain Road, Black Mountain

Project update

Multiple crews have been working across the Black Mountain Road landslip site to complete the key works designed to provide long-term stability.

Piling has continued over the last couple of months, with all 266 piles on track to be completed in October. The piles create a large structural frame where the road is anchored to a deeper underground section beyond the area of failure.

In early September, the soil nail crew moved onto the installation of almost 70 anchor-like structures upslope, which is to further support the concrete structure.

The site continues to be highly constrained with piling rigs, cranes, soil nail rig, concrete trucks and general earthmoving equipment. For this reason, site access cannot be permitted for non-construction traffic, including during the Christmas shutdown period.



Construction timeframe – Where to from here?



Oct 2024

Piling to be completed.

Nov and Dec 2024

- Concrete works to connect the piles.
 The two capping beams will be 2.3m high, 2.45m wide, and 132m long.
- Concrete drainage works culverts and lined drains.

Some concrete works need to start at 3am. This is only required for approximately 15 nights over an eight-week period.

Late Dec 2024 to early Jan 2025

Construction shutdown

Site access will not be permitted during the shutdown period.

Jan 2025

Construction restarts.
Concrete works continue.

Feb to Apr 2025

Rebuild road including:

- covering drainage layers
- build concrete road base
- new pavement
- signage, guardrail and linemarking.

During this time, the project team will regularly assess the feasibility of opening any section of road for traffic.

Apr 2025

Final earthworks. Site demobilisation.



April 2025


BE PREPARED
